## Post Boxes in Bosworth Area.

Earlier in the year the Letter Box Study Group survey of post boxes throughout the country triggered a flurry of interest about our own local boxes. Chris Peat of Carlton let us have a page from the very first issue of *The Carlton News* from February 1990 which reported on the resiting of the Victorian post box in Main Street, Carlton.

These features both became normal. Slots for the collection tablet were not originally fitted and

The box is located near the church and by the side of the old telephone kiosk.

Oh and before anyone contacts us we are aware of another postal box in Carlton on the main Bosworth Road – a post 1953 one.

Derek Meller in Barton has been in touch about a post box site in Barton in the Beans. He sent Ask Aspect a picture of a wall showing where the original letter box was sited in Main Street around 1885. It is not known when it was actually moved.
