Meanwhile Roger Loseby passed on to us a programme for the day of the event. The "Challenge Tug-o-War between Market Bosworth and Carlton" was advertised as taking place at 12.00 noon on Coronation Day, Tuesday $2^{\text {nd }}$ June, 1953. Other events shown on this typed sheet, issued by the Coronation Committee, were 9.30 to 11.00 Distribution of Souvenir Beakers for all children of school age and under at St. Peter's Hall.

2.00 Open Fancy Dress Parade in the grounds of the Park Infirmary. Prizes to the value of $£ 8$ were to be awarded.
3.30 Children's Free Tea [for under 10s] at St. Peter's Hall. Then at 4.30 for the 10 s and over. On the previous afternoon an "Old People's Free Meat Tea" for the over 60s was held at the Central Café.
8.00 Open Public Dance at St. Peter's Hall [free admission].
10.00 Bonfire, held in Bosworth Park by kind permission of Major Vero.

The sheet ended by mentioning, "A Coronation Souvenir will be delivered to each household which has subscribed to the Coronation Fund" and that "prizes totalling $£ 4$ will be awarded for the best decorated houses and shops in Market Bosworth and Coton". "God Save The Queen".

Ask Aspect is bound to ask if anyone has photographs or stories of this memorable day which we can include in June - the $64^{\text {th }}$ anniversary of the coronation in Her Majesty's $65^{\text {th }}$ year on the throne.
