## **Carlton's Spring Collection – of gardens**

On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> May 2024 a number of gardens in Carlton will be open to the public under the National Garden Scheme (NGS), also known as the yellow booklet scheme. These gardens will showcase early spring flowering and will provide a variety of colour and interest for everyone. The gardens are of varying size and lay-out and we hope that many local people will come along to support this event. The NGS supports nursing charities such as Macmillan, Marie Curie and Hospice UK, among others and £3.1 million was donated to charity through the scheme last year.

## **Carlton Big Dig**

The full report of the Carlton Big Dig has been published and can be downloaded from the Parish Council website (along with a film of the event). Twenty test pits were dug by volunteers over the weekend of 10-11<sup>th</sup> September 2022, and 6,115 individual finds were recovered, dating from the Bronze Age to the present day. The scatter of Bronze Age worked flints represents a general background of prehistoric activity while a small assemblage of Roman pottery is probably associated with a farmstead to the east of the church. The later pottery suggests that the village originally formed around the church in the 12<sup>th</sup> century, with secondary settlement around Carlton Green in the 13<sup>th</sup> century. The area around Carlton Gate was not settled until the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

The Carlton Dig is part of the wider Bosworth Links Project which is investigating the development of Market Bosworth and the surrounding communities. A community-driven research project of this kind has never been caried out before. This year digs took place in Far Coton in April and Cadeby in September, but the results have yet to be published. There will be another dig in April 2024; location to be decided. This project is open to everyone, offers a wide variety of activities and a hands-on introduction to archaeology; is great fun; and is producing significant new infomation on the history of our area. ## **Neighbourhood Watch**

There were 5 reported crimes in Carlton from June to August 2023. These were 1 criminal damage and/or arson, 2 other theft, 1 violence and/sexual assault and 1 other crime. In August reported crime in our Bosworth Beat area fell to its lowest level for 12 months – good news!

#### **Bosworth Beat Team**

Local priorities for the Team remain road safety, anti-social behaviour and rural crime. In early October the Team took enforcement action against offenders in our area with Operation Fortune. This followed an investigation into a series of house burglaries across Hinckley, Blaby and Market Bosworth areas where properties were being broken into for car keys, allowing the offenders to steal the cars outside. Local Officers raided 2 industrial units leading to the arrest of 1 male and the seizure of car parts from multiple stolen vehicles. Do consider the use of prevention measures such as house alarms, visible steering wheel locks or tracking devices to help protect your vehicles and property.

#### **NHW**

Online, phone and other cyber crime remains relentless. This month a Carlton resident was almost parted from £3,500 in the very convincing "Hi Mum/Dad this is my new phone number" scam which is doing the rounds. Please question anything that asks for money and never click on any links unless you are 100% certain who you are dealing with as this may expose your phone to financial hackers.

A recent survey showed that the age group most likely to have been scammed in the last 12 months was 45-54 year olds with the second most at-risk group 18-24 year olds. Surprised? It may be that middle-aged people are seen as more wealthy and therefore more attractive targets or that they are simply buying more things online. The younger, supposedly more tech-savvy group may be at greater risk as they haven't yet learned to be on their guard. The bottom line is no one of any age can afford to think they are immune from scams.

As we move towards Christmas please be aware of advance fee fraud which rose 82% last

year. This is where you are asked to pay an upfront fee for services, loans or high-value goods that never materialise. Scams can be avoided by sticking to well-known and trusted retailers, looking for the padlock symbol on the website address bar and using secure payment such as Paypal or credit card.

Two in three online shopping scams now start on social media: the warning signs to look out for are prices that are too good to be true, you're being rushed into making a bank transfer and the seller won't let you see an item in person even if it's local. Please stay vigilant and don't be rushed!

If you have been a victim of fraud, attempted fraud or cybercrime please report it to <u>Action Fraud</u> or 0300 123 2040. Text fraud or phishing can be forwarded to 7726. Reporting scams keeps the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau aware of the scale of this often-hidden crime.

## **Carlton Mill**

Roger Payne of Osbaston recently visited the Earp family, who used to farm at Osbaston House Farm. While there, he was shown a counterweight which was at the farm when the family took it over in 1911 and is believed to have come from Sparrowble Mill at Carlton.

Helen Earp has kindly provided the following information: the weight is made of rough-hewn granite, weighs 6 stone, is 12 inches wide at the base and 6" at the top, and measures 14" high including the ring. This little bit of Carlton has now found a new role as a doorstop in rural Suffolk.

## **Nailstone Platinum Jubilee Country Park**

I drive past the new Aldi Distribution Centre fairly regularly on my way through Nailstone to the A50 and M1, and have been watching the building works progress and tree plantings taking place nearby and across the road. However, I had no idea of the transformation that has been taking place on the northern side of the former Nailstone Colliery site.

Borough Councillor Bill Crooks recently attended the opening of a new Education Centre on the site, and spoke about this at a meeting of Nailstone Parish Council, so I decided to explore.

The official car park is at the western end of Battram village, but there is a convenient little lay-by near the Bagworth Road/Wood Road/B582/B585 cross roads to the east of Nailstone. There is a tarmac footway along this road from Nailstone village, and I have wondered vaguely why. Well, following this footway across the cross roads and into the adjacent woodland I soon found out!



There is a signposted circular walk, on surfaced paths through old and new woodlands and grassland all the way to Battram Woods, and then around the northern side of the old colliery site back to the B585. After crossing the B585 there is a surfaced track set back from the road with more new woodland plantings to the south. Once past the new Aldi building, the track crosses the B585 again, and leads past a series of ponds to the starting point.

There are a few puddles and wet places on the last section of this route, but it will be an excellent circular walk in the winter when local footpaths get a bit squidgy. The new paths have no stiles, and also mean that it is now possible to walk from Harry's Grave at Carlton through Nailstone to Battram, Pretoria Road in Ibstock, and Ellistown Farm without climbing a single stile. The route to Ellistown itself is partly

a bridleway and has a couple of bridleway gates, and then two crush stiles near the houses at the end.

As well as the circular walk outlined above there are many other paths and connections to the local Rights of Way network which will allow other circular stile-free routes. This is a major new recreational facility for our area and I recommend a visit.

#### **Parish Council News**

**QR codes** – have been installed at key points around the village and will link to the Parish Council website. The website has been updated so as to provide easy access to information about the village for the benefit of visitors.

**Bus shelter** – plans to install a green roof on the Barton Road bus shelter have been abandoned.

Jubilee Orchard – has been entered into the RHS Its Your Neighbourhood Scheme.

**Community Speedwatch** – there was no interest in this proposal, so it will not be taken forward.

**Congerstone Lane** – will be closed on 9<sup>th</sup> December for up to two days.

**Daffodils** – additional clumps of daffodils have been planted around the village by the Carlton Gardening Group.

Crimes are best reported on-line at www.leics.police.uk/report-online. The alternative is to ring 101, but be aware that this service can be very slow. Individual officers can be contacted by voicemail by ringing 101 and then quoting their collar number.
