Test and trace support payments

If you have been told by the NHS to self-isolate, either because you have tested positive for COVID-19 or you have been in contact with someone who has tested positive, you may be eligible to apply for a test and trace support payment.

To be eligible for the scheme, you must be a Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council resident and meet all four of the following criteria:

1. You must have been asked to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace, either because you have tested positive for COVID-19 or have recently been in close contact with someone who has tested positive, and have been given a test and trace number;
2. You must be employed or self-employed;
3. You must be unable to work from home and have a significant loss of income as a result of having to stay at home and self-isolate;
4. You must be currently receiving universal credit, working tax credit, income-based employment and support allowance, income-based jobseeker's allowance, income support, housing benefit and/or pension credit.

There is also a discretionary scheme if you are on a low income and suffering severe financial hardship because of self-isolation. Details can be found on the H&BBC website.

Horticultural & Produce Show

All residents are invited to join the Carlton Parish Plan Group

The Parish Plan is based on a wide-ranging survey of local opinion. It is an important document, which informs and underpins the work of the Parish Council and other local authorities and organisations.

The current Parish Plan, prepared in 2011, can be found on the Parish Council's website. Work on updating it will begin early in 2021 with the creation of a team of volunteers.

The work comprises designing, delivering and collecting a questionnaire, followed by analysing the responses and writing the final report. The project timetable is for questionnaire design to be complete by July 2021; questionnaires delivered in September and collected in October and November 2021; data analysis to be complete by the end of March 2022; the final report to be published in July 2022, followed by a public meeting in August 2022 to discuss the results.

Covid-19 restrictions may require much of the preliminary work to be done by email, and it may not be possible to hold public meetings to publicise the project.

St Andrew's Community Hub

Another update on the creation of the community space for us all, the St Andrew's Community Hub.

As ever I wanted to start with the good news. We are now within £55,000 of our funding target having identified over £180,000 of funding so far. Your efforts recently on-line at the Crowd Funding website and with the Buy a Brick campaign, started by Bill Sharp and Chris Peat, show how committed Carlton villagers are to getting this new facility. Thank you.

The website closed during October (it was hosted by Aviva), but the Buy a Brick campaign is still going. I will be putting notices up around Carlton to let you know how you can donate to this campaign. Any donation of £2 or more will be added to a scroll of donors displayed in the new Hub. My thanks to Simon Cooper for selling 104 'bricks' recently. We have met with the stonemasons who will build our small extension to the church, remove some of the pews and refurbish and redecorate the affected areas of the building. They are ready to start work once all of our funding has been obtained. If you are interested in purchasing one or more of the pews once they have been removed, please contact Bill Sharp or Murray Lockwood. Some of you may also have noticed that we have already removed the small ramshackle shed to the rear of the church, as this would have been in the way of the extension.

Sadly, there is still mixed news on funding. As in the previous update, many funders are understandably and rightly prioritising Covid-19 initiatives. Unfortunately, this has meant that they are deferring decisions on projects such as ours. During the summer we wrote to many smaller charities to see if they would support us. As I write we are waiting on decisions from 11 of these when their trustees meet during the autumn.

At this critical stage of our project, we would be very grateful if you decided to support the creation of our Community Hub by making a donation to the project, either through Buy a Brick or direct to our charity, The Friends of St Andrew's. Recently there have been burglaries overnight in Market Bosworth where cars have been stolen with keys. These are believed to have occurred between 2.15 am and 2.30 am. A timely reminder to all Carlton residents that valuable cars on drives, sleeping residents and car key fobs easily available represent an opportunity for thieves. Please don't make it easy for them!

NHW National Update

The clocks go back on Sunday 25 October and NHW are running their Darker Nights awareness campaign. Thieves like dark nights so please:

- * Make sure your house looks lived in, even when you're out
- * If you have a house alarm, ensure you set it before you go out and ensure all doors and windows are locked
- * Lights on indoors give the impression someone is home. Use timer switches to automatically turn on lighting and lamps when you're away or out for the evening.
- * Burglars don't like external security lights, make sure you use these during the darker nights and leaving on all night will cost very little with economy bulbs. The streetlights go out at midnight in Carlton but porch or drive lights left on make our village a less attractive proposition to burglars or vehicle thieves
- * If you see someone acting suspiciously please call 101. Leicestershire Police will not mind. Always call 999 in an emergency or if you witness a crime in action.

Last chance to apply

Time is very short for young people aged from 16 to 23 to apply for a grant of up to £200. The trustees of Carlton Charity Lands next meet on 18th November 2020 to consider any applications that have been received. Applications must be submitted by 4th November 2020 (or later by arrangement).

Recipients do not have to pay the grant back. The impact of the recent virus has caused much disruption to young people's lives. We are hoping that our grants can support them in their return to education and training.

If you are, or you know of such a young person, who is in or planning to go into Further Education or training they will be eligible for a grant from the Charity Lands Fund. Grants are made to help with the costs of apprenticeships, buying books, equipment, fees, travel costs and starting a business.

Speed and traffic monitoring

Our speed indicator device (SID) monitored southbound vehicles on Bosworth Road between 17th and 27th August. During this period 7,458 vehicles were counted: the average number was 690/day on weekdays, and 668/day over the week as a whole. The average speed was 33.8 mph and the 85th percentile speed 41.1 mph. The highest speed recorded was 65mph at 20:55hrs on 18th August.

From 31st August to 20th September the SID monitored northbound vehicles on Bosworth Road. During this period 16,690 vehicles were counted: the average number was 843/day on weekdays, and 794/day over the week as a whole. The average speed was 34.3 mph, and the 85th percentile speed 44.0 mph. The highest speed recorded was 70 mph at 21:35 hrs on 31st August.

Toxocara – can be passed to sheep from dog faeces. One landowner in Carlton has reported a case this year – the mother sheep went blind, gave birth to two still born lambs, and then died. This was not only very distressing for the owner of the animal, but costly in terms of care, vets bills, and the loss of the livestock. Please keep to footpaths and do not allow your dog to foul grazing land.

Kissing gates – thanks to a grant from Leicestershire County Council, steel kissing gates are to be installed at the Congerstone Road end of the footpath from Little Lane across the railway line; at the Barton Road end of the footpath which runs along the southern side of Barton in the Beans; and at the A447 end of the footpath from Harry's Grave to Nailstone. The latter gate is being funded by the same grant scheme, but with 50% from the allocation to Nailstone PC and 50% from the allocation to Carlton PC. We thank the landowners for their support for these improvements, and Nailstone PC for their co-operation.

Accounts – the audit of the Parish Council's accounts for 2019-20 has been completed; documentation can be found on the PC website; I am happy to answer questions about the accounts at any time.

Parish Council Meetings – in future, Carlton PC will meet six times a year, every other month, on the second Wednesday of the month. Dates will be published in the Diary section of Carlton News, and advertised on the Parish noticeboard as usual. Agendas and background documents can be found on the PC website, or just ask me.
